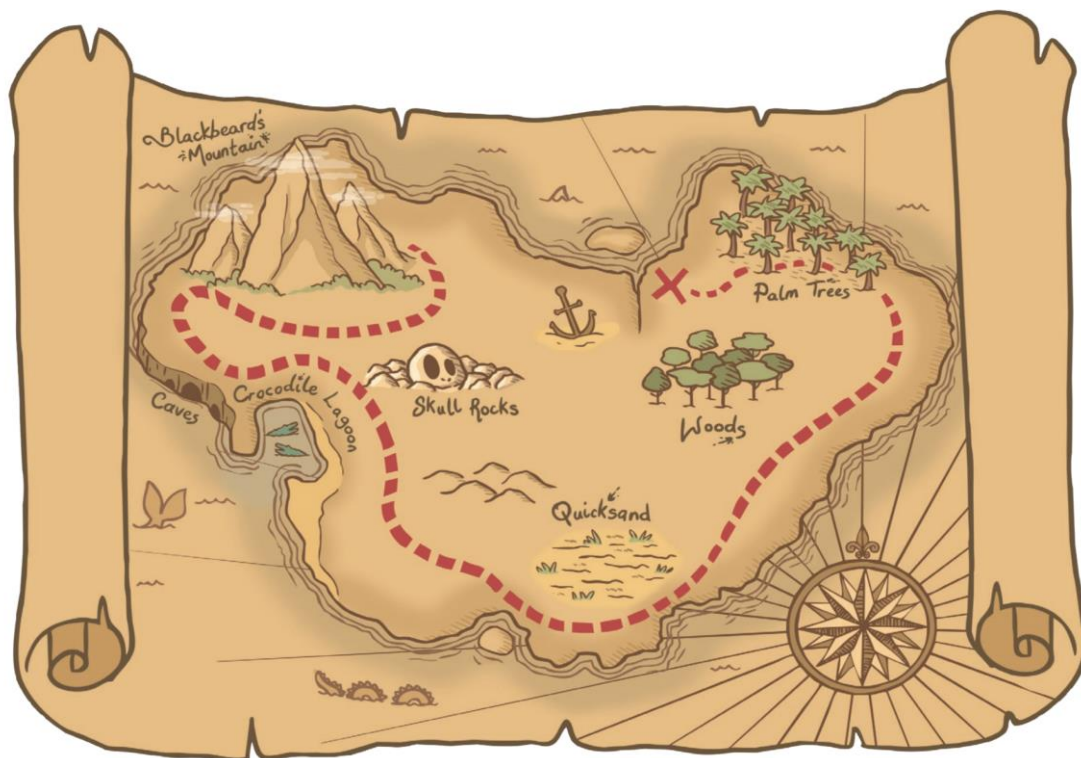


This week we are looking at treasure maps. You are going to create your own treasure map.

You can do this activity in your book.



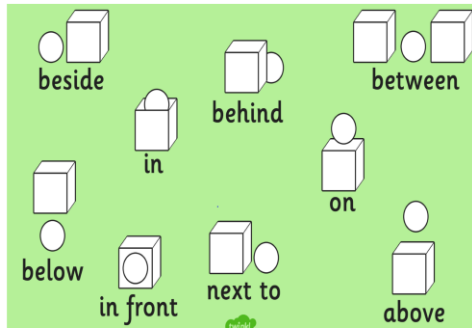
Create noun phrases about the things you can see on the treasure map. Here are some adjectives to help you. I am sure you can think of lots more exciting adjectives!
